Main Aims of the Cardijn VEREIN

✓ To support the development of *liberating and transformative theology* in Europe, with a focus on work and economy

At a time when unemployment is growing dramatically and working and living conditions are under threat it is essential to develop new theologically and spiritually rooted critiques and encourage visions for the future which inspire and support movement for change

✓ To offer *training for change* for those engaged with local groups and movements in relation to living and working conditions

The focus of the Association is on methods of working which are rooted in the everyday life of marginalised people and which support their own actions for change as well as on the development of skills for linking up local actions in a wider network

Training Update

One of the main aims of the Association is to promote and organise training both for those working with marginalised groups and communities and for people who are or who wish to become active in working for change. The Association draws on the insights of the training which was previously organised by ECG, which is called CABLE - meaning Community Action Based Learning for Empowerment. This eight nation programme produced an approach to work and learning which has been inspiring urban and industrial mission and church and society work in many contexts. The second source of insight is the based on the tradition founded by Joseph Cardijn, which is well known process 'See - Judge - Act' to which the Linz colleagues have added 'Celebrate'. There are some similarities between these approaches and these will be explored in future training organised by the Association.

New Ways of Working -

An International Training Programme for Local Workers

Between November 2011 and March 2012, just as the Association was being founded, an international training programme was organised by members of the ECG (European Contact Group) and of the Industrial Mission in Linz Diocese. The 11 participants were from 7 countries and all regions of Europe were represented. The training also assisted the development of a Linz-based training team as the leadership included two new trainers -Rainer Tüchleberger and Michaela Pröstler-Zopf.

Training for Youth Workers

Starting in autumn 2012 and running until January 2013, a training programme for those working with young people including with young Christian workers (KAJ) in Linz Diocese was organised and eight people participated. The programme followed a short version of the CABLE training including the so-called exposure based approach where the workers had to reflect on their experience of 'being' in a specific context in relation to their biography. This provided valuable experience for the participants and also for the possibilities of running further training in Linz. This programme was led by Tony Addy

Catholic Worker Movement (KAB) and Industrial Mission Training

In spring 2013, a special training the trainers' workshop is being organised to experience and develop the CABLE approach for a group involved in industrial mission and KAB training. This is being led by Edeltraud Artner-Papelitzky. Another short programme is being organised with the leadership and volunteers of KAB and this will concentrate mainly on an 'exposure process'.

Seminar on Liberating Theology in Europe

The Cardijn Verein was launched in the context of a seminar on Liberating Theology in Europe which included inputs on contextual challenges from an Italian perspective (Antonella Visinitin) Britain (Ian Winterbottom) and a Czech perspective (Jiri Silny) as well as a theological analytic input in the tradition of liberation theology from Kuno Füssel (Germany). The inputs were reflected in group work and it was agreed that this seminar should be followed up by the new Association in September 2013.


